


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English Language Arts and Mathematics Performance Trends

These graphs show trends in the Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability over the last three years. The data includes the results of students taking both the New Jersey Student Learning Assessment (NJSLA) and the DLM alternate assessment for English language arts (ELA) and mathematics. The Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability measures the percentage of students that met or exceeded expectations on the assessments (NJSLA or DLM) with an adjustment made if the participation rate is below 95% to ensure reporting on at least 95% of students. Students that were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. The table below provides participation rates, proficiency rates, annual targets and status in meeting the targets, and statewide proficiency rates.

Important note for 2021-22: Due to the cancellation of statewide assessments in 2019-20 and 2020-21, statewide assessment results are not available for the 2019-20 and 2020-21 school years.

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

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
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Mathematics Assessment - Performance By Test: Algebra I

This includes any students who were enrolled in an Algebra I course and took the Algebra I assessment in grades 7 through 12. Students in sixth grade who were enrolled in Algebra I course during the 2021-22 school year were required to take both the Algebra I and Grade 6 mathematics assessment. The results of their Algebra I assessment are not included in these results but will be reported when the student in in grade 9.









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

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

This graph shows the percentage of K-12 students by the number of days they were absent during the school year.





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
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Chronic Absenteeism by Grade



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Out-of-Field: A teacher is labeled "out-of-field" if they are potentially teaching outside their area of certification. This could occur if the teacher cannot be found in the NJDDE's certification system, if their job code does not match their certification, of if the teacher has an expired certificate.

Teachers by Subject Area

This table shows the counts of teachers by subject area with gender breakdown, experience, and level of education. The staff counts in this table reflect staff assignments as submitted by districts to NJ SMART and reflect any teachers assigned and are not based on full-time equivalent (FTE). Important Note for 2021-2022: Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, New Jersey received waivers from the United States Department of Education (USED) in both March 2020 and March 2021 that waived accountability-related requirements in the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) for the 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 school years. These waivers removed the requirements to:

Calculate indicator scores and summative scores for the 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 school years;

For the TSI identification that occurred during the 2022-23 school year, status in meeting annual targets for the 2018-19 and 2021-22 school years were used since data was not available for two consecutive years.

Additionally, all schools that were previously identified were eligible to exit status at the end of the 2022-23 school year if the NJDOE's Exit Criteria were met.

The NJDOE received approval to make a one-time change to the identification timeline under the COVID-19 State Plan Addendum. Under the approved Addendum, the NJDOE will identify schools for CSI and ATSI status in both fall 2023 and fall 2023. Schools identified for CSI or ATSI status in fall 2022 will be eligible to exit status in fall 2023 if all exit criteria are met. Schools identified for TSI status will be eligible to exit are met.

As a result, proficiency, growth, and progress toward English language proficiency data is not available for 2019-20 and chronic abenteeism data is not available for 2019-20. The growth measure used for 2021-22 is an alternate measure used because median student growth percentiles were not available for 2021-22. The NJDOE plans to resume reporting median student growth percentiles in 2022-23. As data over the last three years was impacted by the pandemic in various ways, the NJDOE recommends caution in comparing data from year to year.

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Is a Climate Survey Used: Yes; Who is surveyed: Students, Parents, Administrators, Teachers. The NJ School Climate Improvement survey was conducted in the spring of 2022, with plans to readminister it every spring. Feedback from this survey has been utilized to plan, design, implement, and modify programs and processes.

Due to the expansion and renovation of areas, Ocean Township High School now boasts state-of-the-art facilities in physical and performing arts. The Spartan Blackbox Theater, Dance Studio and Music Technology lab facilitate authentic learning experiences in authentic environments. Similarly, the addition of a wrestling room, training facility, auxiliary gym and health classrooms provides for the expansion of programs in physical education and athletics.

OTHS employs a multi-faceted approach to school safety. Regular school safety team meetings and communication and collaboration with the Ocean Township Police Department facillitate improvements to our systems on a regular basis. In addition, with four full time security guards and a Class III Officer from the OTPD, we are able to ensure that the building and perimeter are safe. Our full time SAC, school counselors and Child Study Team also work proactively to meet the emotional needs of our students.



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Through the 1:1 Chromebook initiative, OTHS has not only been able to provide devices for every student but also to initiate significant change in how technology is utilized and implemented in every classroom. The devices, along with an Educational Technology Specialist and focused professional development, have transformed the classroom experience.

To address learning loss due to COVID-19, OTHS has implemented multiple programs and processes to facilitate accelerated learning. During school, after school and summer programs provided opportunities for students to reconnect to their learning and accelerate academically. These programs included but were not limited to peer and staff tutoring and mentoring.
