
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
Student Growth

Student growth is a measure of how much students are learning each year. New Jersey's ESSA state plan outlines that academic progress will be measured with school's median student growth percentile (mSGP) on statewide ELA and mathematics assessments. Each individual student receives a Student Growth Percentile (SGP) for English Language Arts (ELA) in grades 4 through 8 and for Mathematics in grades 4 through 7. The SGP measures their academic progress from one year to the next compared to other students with similar prior test scores (academic peers).

A student's SGP falls between 1 and 99 and can be grouped into three levels. An mSGP below 35 indicates low growth, an mSGP between 35 and 65 indicates typical growth, and an mSGP greater than 65 indicates high growth. If the SGPs for all students are ordered from smallest to largest, the mSGP is the percentile in the middle of the list.

The NJDOE Student Growth page has more information about SGPs and mSGPs, including a video that explains how both SGPs and mSGPs are calculated.

Important Note for 2022-23: Student growth data is not available for the 2019-2020, 2020-2021, and 2021-2022 school years due to federal waivers and assessment cancellations. An alternate measure of academic progress, or growth, called Relative School Improvement Measure (RSIM) was used for the 2021-2022 school years only

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
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

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
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
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These graphs show the median Student Growth Percentile for students in each grade for English Language Arts (ELA) and mathematics.



English Language Arts and Mathematics Performance Trends

These graphs show trends in the Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability over the last three years. The data includes the results of students taking both the New Jersey Student Learning Assessment (NJSLA) and the DLM alternate assessment for English language arts (ELA) and mathematics. The Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability measures the percentage of students who met or exceeded expectations on the assessments (NJSLA or DLM) with an adjustment made if the participation rate is below 95% to ensure reporting on at least 95% of students. Students who were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. The table below provides participation rates, proficiency rates, annual targets and status in meeting the targets, and statewide proficiency rates.

Important note for 2022-23: Due to the cancellation of statewide assessments in prior years, statewide assessment results are not available for the 2020-21 school year.

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





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Climate and Environment

Student absences provide important information about a school's culture and climate. Research shows that absences impact a student's ability to succeed in school. The New Jersey Department of Education used input from New Jersey communities to select chronic absenteeism as its measure of school quality and student success for the ESSA accountability plan. Chronic absenteeism is defined as being absent for 10% or more of the days enrolled during the school year. A student who is not present for any reason, whether excused, unexcused, or for disciplinary action, is considered absent unless permitted by state statute or regulations. Students with fewer than 45 days in membership are excluded from attendance calculations.

Important Note for 2022-23: The NJD0E recommends caution in comparing the 2022-23 chronic absenteeism rates with the rates from prior years as the pandemic has impacted attendance rates over the last several years.

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
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
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Climate and Environment



New Jersey's Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) Accountability System New Jersey's school accountability system identifies schools that are in need of comprehensive and targeted support as required by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). Based on New Jersey's approved ESSA state plan, NJDOE will identify schools in the following four federal categories every three years:

- · Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI): Overall Low Performing:
 - Title I schools with a summative score in the bottom 5% of Title I schools.
- Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI): Low Graduation Rate:
- All high schools with a four-year graduation rate of 67% or less
- · Additional Targeted Support and Improvement: Low Performing Student Group (ATSI):
 - . All schools with one or more student group with a summative score that would be in the bottom 5% of Title I schools
- · Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI): Chronically Low Performing:
 - Title I schools identified as Additional Targeted Support and Improvement; Low Performing Student Group (ATSI) that are identified for three or more consecutive years, i.e., ATSI schools that do not meet exit criteria.
 - The fall 2023 identification is the first year that the NJDOE identified schools in this category.

Annually, NJDOE will identify schools in the following federal category:

- Targeted Support and Improvement: Consistently Underperforming Student Group (TSI):
 - All schools with one or more student groups that missed annual targets or standards for all indicators for two years in a row

For purposes of ESSA accountability, only schools and student groups with data for 20 or more students are included in calculations.

Important Note for 2022-23 Reports: The NJDOE received approval to make a one-time change to the identification timeline under the COVID-19 State Plan Addendum, Under the approved Addendum, the NJDOE identified schools for CSI and ATSI status in both fall 2022 and fall 2023. Schools that were identified for CSI or ATSI status in fall 2022 were eligible to exit status at the end of the 2023-2024 school year if all exit criteria are met. Schools identified for TSI status are eligible to exit annually if exit criteria are met.

The NJDOE resumed using median student growth percentiles (mSGPs) to measure academic progress, or growth, for the 2022-2023 school year. The NJDOE had received approval through the Addendum to use an alternate measure of academic progress, Relative School Improvement Measure (RSIM) for the 2021-2022 school year only because mSGPs were unavailable.

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Accountability

Accountability Summary by Student Group - 2022-23 School Year

The NJDOE is required under ESSA to identify schools for Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) and Additional Targeted Support and Improvement (ATSI). Both TSI and ATSI identifications are based on how student groups within schools perform. Schools are identified for ATSI if they have at least one student group that has a summative score that would be in the bottom 5% of Title I schools if it was its own school. Mission, Vision, Theme:

Our mission is to instill a true passion for lifelong learning and discovery within each child. We emphasize the importance of strong character traits, such as accountability, honesty, respect and kindness. These traits create a positive environment that is safe, nurturing and educational for each member of our school family.



Awards, Recognition, Accomplishments:

The Board of Education and local newspapers recognize the outstanding efforts of our elementary students for excellence in such things as Essay Writing, Poetry Contests as well as Spelling and Geography Bees.



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Students in kindergarten through fourth grade receive instruction in reading, spelling, writing, mathematics, science and social studies in heterogeneously grouped classes through a sequentially organized curriculum. Lessons are developmentally appropriate and aligned with the New Jersey Student Learning Standards. Our reading program (Wonders) is research-based and uses a phonetic approach.

Courses, Curriculum, Instruction:



Sports opportunities are available through the Township of Ocean Human Services and are developmentally appropriate to young children.



Homework Club for grades 1-4, Chorus, Maker Space Club, Safety Patrol Club, Book Club, Art Club, Chess Club



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Project Extend runs for grades PK-4 from 7:00am-8:30am (9:30 for PK) and 3:15pm - 6:00pm. It is run through our town's Department of Human Services.





Staff and Professional Learning:

Professional learning takes place throughout the year and is based on the belief that children learn best in real-world contexts that make sense to children; that all students deserve a richer and more challenging curriculum; and that a balanced and practical approach to learning is best for understanding concepts. PLCs at our school are centered around improving student engagement. We participate in the New Jersey Tiered System of Support Grant. This year's focus is to improve our core instruction in the area of ELA by prioritizing our instructional time in response to formative assessment. Our teachers participate in professional development provided by our State Coach. Individualized and grade level PLC professional development is provided by our building instructional coach, our ELA supervisor, and our building principal. Additional PD is being provided to our BSI/Intervention/RRI teachers to improve our ability to use data to target intervention and monitor student progress.



Student Supports and Services:

Special education classes for resource center and self-contained learning and language disabilities classes utilize additional reading methods with an alternative approach for teaching skills. We also have a Spanish Bilingual program. Mulit- language learners as well as struggling learners receive supplemental instruction as needed. Tiered Intervention Plans address individual student needs through I&RS.



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Breakfast is offered to all students each day. Students are given Physical Education classes 2xs a week. Students take part in a 10 minute recess in the morning and a 30 minute recess during the afternoon. Wayside has a Sensory Room available to use with staff guidance and sensory walks in the hallways to address student sensory concerns. The Guidance Curriculum implements lessons on Growth Mindset kindness in our schools. The guidance counselor has a mailbox for students to their concerns. There are schoolwide SEL activities daily and a Week of Respect.



Parent and Community Involvement:

Our PTA meets monthy and all parents and teachers are free to attend meetings. Our PTA works so very hard to help offset expenses for our local families by paying for all school trips, some technology and classroom supplies and games. The PTA is committed to involving all parents in an effort to support our children. We have a parent portal and it is utilized daily. ESL and Bilingual family nights are used to share information. PTA offers Chess Club for student engagement. The PTA organizes many family oriented activites throughout the year. PTA has a newsletter that informs parents of upcoming events in both English and Spanish.

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Our school is 53 years old and was built in 1969. An additional wing was added in 1998. Recent renovations in 2016 include air conditioning, new art room, upgrades to the music room and six small group instruction rooms. Pre K rooms and MD classrooms modified to adapt to the needs of the students. The addition of a PK playground was completed in November 2021.



School Safety committee meets periodically throughout the year involving staff and parents to adjustments in procedures that best meet the needs of all students. We discuss with the parent and teacher committee updated guidelines of HIB and take a proactive approach to educating students.



Students have access to chrome books 1:1 throughout the day. We also have two technology coaches that help faciliate educational technology in the class.



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Wayside housed the first full day preschool in the district. For the 2023-2024 school year we have 7 full day three and four year old classes in an integrated program and two PSD classes for a total of 105 students. We have also have employeed two PK inst to help with the development and implenation of curriculum and procedures.



ESSER funds have been utilized to make up for student learning loss, ensure equitability for our disadvantaged groups, and provide social and emotional support, through the implementation of Accelerating Spartans afterschool program. Accelerating Spartans services students in first through fourth grades. A program facilitator and five certified educators review student data and create lessons specific to student needs. Identified students who attend this afterschool program receive homework help, intensive Math/ELA support, STEM, SEL, and Fine Arts. Our afterschool program has proven to be a wonderful resource for our students. Improved academic performance and increased self-regulation skills are evidence that our program has had a positive impact on our school community. We will continue to offer enrichment programs, such as this one, to further support and engage our students.



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Our school environment lends itself to offering many opportunities for children to learn and demonstrate tolerance, compassion and understanding of other people's needs and ideas. Waysdie has a very diverse population. We work very hard to create a climate of respect and kindness. Our school moto is to respect one another. It is expected that students show great effort and be a good citizen. We incorporate lessons on Internet safety and information literacy to help students develop the skills and behaviors necessary for becoming safe and strong digital citizens. We have a full time school counselor who supports the staff and students in providing a climate of open communication and respect. Any personal, social or academic concerns that arise are promptly handled so students know they can always come to an adult for support. We also have a SAC counselor who assistances students social emotiongal growth. We are committed to excellence and look forward to the joys and challenges of the future.
