Summer Reading BINGO

This summer, all students entering grades 5-8 will choose a book (fiction or nonfiction) that sparks their interest and provides an appropriate level of challenge. Students should read a “new to you” book. Please avoid reading titles that have been assigned in previous grade levels. Lists of recommended titles for each grade are available at the end of this packet.

We encourage parents/guardians to talk with your students about their book choices in order to find a book that is the best fit for your family.

In addition to choosing and reading a book, we encourage students to participate in several fun, optional BINGO activities! Students may choose to complete the BINGO activities to have fun and win prizes!

Directions for BINGO Board

- 1. Complete the activities in the squares on the board to make a “Bingo.” “Bingo” is 5 boxes in a row - horizontal, vertical, or diagonal - or all 4 corners and the middle square.**
- 2. Each square on the board is either a book to read or an activity to complete.**
- 3. Mark your completed squares by crossing them out with an “X.”**
- 4. Everyone must complete the “Golden Box” in the middle by reading a book of your choice. Reading a book of your choice is required. Complete the other activities for fun and to win prizes!**
- 5. All students who complete at least one Bingo will receive a small prize, and be entered into a raffle to win a grand prize (to be announced).**

Recommended Books for Students Entering Sixth Grade

***The Fairy Tale Detectives* (Sisters Grimm Series #1)**

by Michael Buckley

With the winning combination of *Nancy Drew* meets *Shrek*, this first book in the new *Sisters Grimm* series will entertain with a hilarious mix of mysteries and fairy tale twists. In the tradition of *Lemony Snicket's Series of Unfortunate Events* and *The Spiderwick Chronicles* comes a new humorous mystery of fantastic circumstances. *The Sisters Grimm (Book One): The Fairy Tale Detectives* introduces us to two orphaned sisters, Sabrina and Daphne, who are sent to live with their mysterious grandmother, Relda Grimm. Grandmother Grimm lives in a strange town in New York State, known for its extraordinary number of unexplained and unusual crimes. As soon as the sisters arrive, they begin to unravel a mystery that leads to their ancestors' magical beginnings. Sabrina and Daphne learn they are descendants of the Brothers Grimm, who were actually detectives of the magical phenomenon perpetrated by the Everafters, a parallel race of magical beings. They soon discover it is the Grimm family's legacy to keep the Everafters in line and the two sisters are the sole heirs to this challenge!

Michael Arroyo, a 13-year-old Cuban immigrant, dreams of playing in the Little League World Series. After all, he's an excellent pitcher on his team, and he lives next to Yankee Stadium. But how can his team from the South Bronx beat the rich kids from the suburbs? Michael has more than baseball on his mind, however, as he must deal with the death of his father, and his decision (with big brother Carlos) to keep the death a secret to avoid foster care. Sports fans will relish the on-court action, expertly rendered in Lupica's taut prose.

While Helen was hiding in Amsterdam, Alfons was a fanatic believer in Hitler's "master race." While she was crammed in a cattle car bound for the death camp Auschwitz, he was a teenage commander of frontline troops, ready to fight and die for the glory of Hitler and the Fatherland. This book tells both of their stories, side-by-side, in an overwhelming account of the nightmare.

Amos Fortune Free Man

"It does a man no good to be free until he learns how to live." These were the words of Amos Fortune, born the son of a king of the At-mun-shi tribe in Africa. When Amos was only fifteen years old, he was captured by slave traders and brought to Massachusetts, where he was sold at auction. Although his freedom had been taken, Amos never lost his dignity and courage. He dreamed of being free and of buying the freedom of his closest friends. By the time he was sixty years old, Amos Fortune began to see those dreams come true. Amos Fortune, Free Man is a Newbery Award winner that is based on a true story.

Joey Pigza Swallowed the Key

To the constant disappointment of his mother and his teachers, Joey has trouble paying attention or controlling his mood swings when his prescription medications wear off and he starts getting worked up and acting wired. In this antic yet poignant new novel, Jack Gantos has perfect pitch in capturing the humor, the off-the-wall intensity, and the serious challenges that life presents to a kid dealing with hyperactivity and related disorders.

The Society tells her it's a glitch, a rare malfunction, and that she should focus on the happy life she's destined to lead with Xander. But Cassia can't stop thinking about Ky, and as they slowly fall in love, Cassia begins to doubt the Society's infallibility and is faced with an impossible choice: between Xander and Ky, between the only life she's known and a path that no one else has dared to follow.

The Girl Who Drank the Moon

THE GIRL WHO DRANK THE MOON is the story of Luna, taken as a baby from her family in the Protectorate as part of a cruel ritual designed to keep the populace fearful and compliant. Though the Elders circulate a story that an evil witch demands the annual sacrifice, they don't realize there's actually a good witch who saves and protects the babies. When Xan rescues Luna, she accidentally feeds her moonbeams that "enmagic" her, so she decides to adopt and raise Luna in a family that includes a dragon and a wise bog monster. Luna's magical powers prove to be unpredictable and unruly, so Xan casts a spell that cocoons the magic until her 13th birthday. Will Luna harness her magic successfully? This story is interwoven with stories from the Protectorate about an antagonist who feeds on the sorrow of others, Luna's mother who yearns for her lost daughter, and a brave couple who challenge the status quo.

There she meets four-year-old Frankie Sky, a little boy who bears an almost eerie resemblance to Simon, and Francesca begins to wonder if it's possible Frankie could be his reincarnation.

Code Talker: A Novel About the Navajo Marines of World War Two
