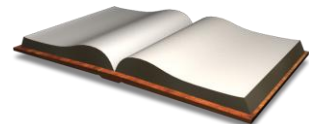




Modified Works Cited Forms for First and Second Grades

NJCCCS 8.1.2.D.1 for Technology Literacy states that students in Grades 1 and 2 are to “model legal and ethical behaviors when using both print and non-print information by citing resources.” Thus, the following modified Works Cited form has been developed for our youngest students who are just beginning to learn about research and citing resources. We hope you find this to be helpful.



First Grade

Books

Author. *Title of book*. Year. Medium.

Example:

Smith, Mary. *Planets*. 2012. Print.

Websites

Author. "Article Title." *Title of the Website*. Medium.

Example:

Brown, Mark. "Polar Bears." *Ask Kids*. Web.

Second Grade

Books

Author. *Title of book*. Year. Medium.

Example:

Smith, Mary. *Planets*. 2012. Print.

Websites

Author. *Title of the Website*. Medium of publication.

Date of Access. (Note indent of second line and double spacing.)

Example:

Brown, Mark. *Ask Kids*. Web. 15 May 2012.



MLA WORKS CITED FORMS FOR GRADES 3-5

On the following pages, you will find the Works Cited forms that are to be used in Grades 3-5 in the Township of Ocean School District with examples provided. These are based on the 2009 MLA Handbook and coincide with the MLA Works Cited formats used in Grades 6-12 in our District. For more information on MLA Works Cited format, please refer to the MLA 6-12 listing under Student Resources on the navigation menu on the Township of Ocean School District's homepage.

Please be reminded that when using other people's words, they **MUST** be given credit! To do otherwise may constitute plagiarism.



MLA Work Cited Guidelines and Samples

- The work cited page should have the title **Work Cited** or **Works Cited** centered at the **top of its own page**.
- All entries should be listed **alphabetically**.
- Authors are always listed with **last name first**.
- **Do not use bullets or numbers** for the list.
- The entire work cited page should be **double-spaced**.
- Book, database, magazine, and periodical titles are to be *italicized*, while article titles should have **quotation marks**.
- The **second line**, as well as any other line after the first, should be indented as in the examples below. This is called a **hanging indent**.
- **Be consistent in using either one or two spaces after a period** within the work cited page.

Author. *Title of book*. City of publication: Publisher, Year. Medium.

One author

Adler, David A. *Biography of Abraham Lincoln*. New York: Holiday House, 2004. Print.

Two authors

Gleiter, Jan, and Kathy Thompson. *Polar Bears*. Milwaukee: Raintree Childrens' Books, 1998.

Print.

No author given

Webster's Word Histories. Springfield: Merriam, 1989. Print.

eBooks

Author. *Title of eBook*. City of publication: Publisher, Year. *Title of Database*. Medium.

Date accessed.

Berger, Sharon. *Allotment Gardening: An Organic Guide for Beginners*. Devon [England]:

Green Books, 2005. *NetLibrary*. Web. 18 April 2009.

Reference Books, including Encyclopedia Entries in Print--Signed

Author of Article. "Article Title." *Title of Book*. Edition. Year of Publication. Medium.

Boritt, Gabor S. "Abraham Lincoln." *The World Book Encyclopedia*. 2002 ed. 2002. Print.

Reference Books, including Encyclopedia Entries in Print—Unsigned

"Egypt." *The World Book Encyclopedia*. 2010 ed. 2010. Print.

Electronic Databases, including Encyclopedia Entries found online

***If no page numbers are found, use: n.pag. to show that no page numbers are given.**

Author. "Article Title." *Title of Periodical*. Volume and issue number (Date of publication): Page numbers. *Title of database*. Medium. Date of Access.

Chan, Evans. "Postmodernism and Hong Kong Cinema." *Postmodern Culture*. 10.3 (2000): n. pag. *Project Muse*. Web. 5 June 2008.

"de Kooning, Willem." *Encyclopedia Britannica Online*. Encyclopaedia Britannica, 2008. Web. 15 May 2008.

Magazines

Author. "Title of Article." *Title of Magazine* Date: Page(s). Medium.

Talcott, Richard. "Great Comets." *Astronomy* May 2004: 36.41. Print.

Newspapers

Author. “Title of Article.” *Title of Newspaper* **Date, Edition: Page(s). Medium.**

Jeromack, Paul. “This Once, a David of the Art World Does Goliath a Favor.” *New York Times*
13 July 2002, late ed.: B7+. Print.

Websites

Author. “Article Title.” *Title of the Website.* **Publisher or sponsor of the website, Date of electronic publication. Medium of Publication. Date of Access.**

NOTE: The formatting for websites, which often do not conform to established standards, is as follows:

1. Name of the author (if given)
2. Title of the work (italicized if the work is independent; in quotation marks if the work is part of a larger work)
3. Title of the overall website (italicized) if distinct from the title of the work
4. Version or edition used (if available)
5. Publisher or sponsor of the site; if not available, use n.p.
6. Date of publication (day, month, and year, as available); if nothing is available, use n.d.
7. Medium of publication (Web, PDF file, etc.)
8. Date of access (day, month, and year)

Pictures or Images (also known as Digital Files)

Artist's Name. Title of the Picture or Image. Date of Creation. Institution and city where the work is housed. Name of the web site. Medium. Date Accessed.

Klee, Paul. Twittering Machine. 1922. Museum of Modern Art, New York. The Artchive.
Web. 22 May 2006.

If the work is posted via a username, use that username for the author.

brandychloe. "Great Horned Owl Family." Photograph. Webshots. American Greetings, 22
May 2006. Web. 5 Nov. 2009.

YouTube or Other Video Clips

*Provide the author only if you are certain that the person created the video. Otherwise, treat the citation as if there is no author.

Author. "Title of Video." Online posting. Title of Website, Date video was posted. Web. Date video accessed.

Web. 30 April 2010.

"Slingshot fun." Online posting. YouTube, 29 January 2007. Web. 30 April 2010.

Blogs

*Provide the author's name only if the creator's first and last names are available. Do not use the user name given. Otherwise, treat the citation as if there is no author.

Author. “Title of Blog Post.” *Title of Blog.* *Blog Site Name*, Date blog was posted. **Web.**
Date blog was accessed.

Supak, Sharon. “Pesticides Linked to Frog Mutations.” *Organic Gardening News and Advice Blogspot*, 2 March 2006. **Web.** 13 March 2008.

Tweets

Author. (User name). “The tweet in its entirety.” **Date, time.** **Tweet.**

Athar, Sohaib. (ReallyVirtual). “Helicopter hovering above Abbottabad at 1AM (is a rare event).” 1 May 2011, 3:58 p.m. **Tweet.**

Interviews

Hughes, Eleanor. Personal interview. 17 March 2005.

Field Trips

Township of Ocean Historical Museum. Ocean Township, New Jersey. 17 March 2005. **Field Trip.** (Use the date on which the museum was visited.)

Surveys

Higgins, Jennifer “Hot Lunch Options.” 15 March 2005. **Survey.** (Use the date of the survey.)

Television

“Why the Towers Fell.” *Nova*. PBS. WNET, New York. 6 Sept. 2004. **Television.**
